It has been a busy term in the garden with lots happening. Our latest project has been designing and perfecting the 'Spacinator'. This started out as an egg carton to space out seeds (seed planting with kids ;what could go wrong)? #!

The egg carton was extremely successful and our broad beans and peas are looking fantastic, evenly spaced out and planted at an appropriate depth. The students have been designing Spacinator on the 3d printer, hopefully these will be printed soon. As we had lots of seeds to plant last week we improvised and came up with the one pictured. It seemed to work well. We will wait and see how good our germination is soon.



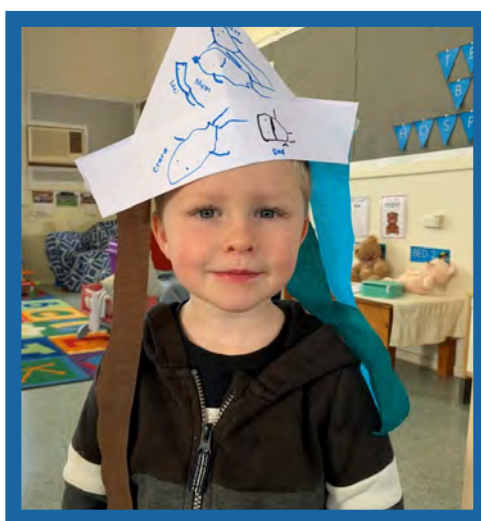
As always there is lots happening here are just some of the things we achieved this term.

- Construction of the new compost bays
- Digging over beds and adding our own compost

- Studying insects
- Planting seeds, seedlings and a donated boysenberry
- Lots of weeding
- Transplanting the Chinese gooseberry
- Digging up Jerusalem artichokes and horseradish

Eligibility for preschool

Children are entitled to access 4 Terms (1 year) of Government Preschool in the year before they start school.

The mid-year intake will begin for preschool from 2023. This means for 2023, children who turn 4 years of age:

- ⇒ • Before 1 May continue to start preschool at the beginning of the year.
- ⇒ • From 1 May to 31 October can commence preschool at the mid year intake at the start of Term 3 of that year.
- ⇒ • Regardless of whether your child starts at the beginning of the year or through a mid year intake they will undertake 4 Terms of Preschool.
- ⇒ • Children who turn 4 years after 31st October will be eligible to start preschool at the beginning of the following year.
